MAP-21

The buzz right now is all about MAP-21, the new federal transportation authorization act and what it means for transit systems. Federal and state agencies are still sorting through the 600-page bill and trying to interpret the new language and determine what it means. MnDOT will be hosting a workshop on September 17 in the Twin Cities area on the contents of MAP-21 and what the changes from SAFETEA-LU mean for Minnesota. Transportation Finance Advisory Committee

The Transportation Finance Advisory Committee, appointed by Governor Dayton to study funding needs in transportation, has continued to meet as they prepare to present a final report to the governor and legislature by the end of the year.

For transit systems, the Committee has been presented with the following information:

Greater Minnesota Transit

- Estimated anticipated revenue from current sources: \$1.9 Billion from 2013 to 2032.
- Estimated cost to meet 100% of the need by 2032: \$2.8 Billion
- Gap between needs and revenue = \$900 million
- If the state were to maintain current transit service levels from 2013 to 2032, there would be a \$20 million shortfall.

St. Cloud Metro Bus Transit Center renovation, reopening celebration

Public Art project surrounding Transit Center next

The final phase of the Metro Bus Transit Center renovation and expansion project was completed and reopened July 30.

The Transit Center closed May 14th for renovations and improvements to all concrete parking and passenger sidewalk surfaces. Passenger services relocated to temporary site one block west during construction. A grand reopening rider thank you event was held the week of August 6th with a free ride day, brat and hot dog day, coffee and muffin day, and employee and ribbon cutting day along with a food collection drive for local food shelves.

The 1.2 million dollar project began in 2010 with interior building remodeling— the first major renovation of the Transit Center since it opened in 1992. Improvements were made to the Transit Center's interior to create a more welcoming, updated and comfortable space. The Transit Center property footprint expanded to the west after the purchase and demolition of an office building next door was completed in 2011.

Metro Bus has also partnered with neighboring property owners, the City of St. Cloud, and St. Cloud Arts Commission to solicit area artists to design, fabricate and install permanent art pieces along the walls of the buildings surrounding the Transit Center. The artwork will serve as a focal point of a newly revived 5th Avenue corridor for the City of St. Cloud. The artwork will complement the surrounding environment and neighboring facilities, and reflect or develop the character of Downtown and its rich transit heritage.

Annually, over 750,000 bus riders pass through or utilize the Transit Center services.

Exterior Renovations

- New concrete parking and sidewalk surfaces
- Three additional bus parking stalls
- Wider sidewalks on the north and south sides of the Transit Center to provide more passenger loading space
- Heated passenger loading sidewalks around the Transit Center building to prevent snow and ice buildup
- Detectable warning tiles along passenger loading platforms to assist people with visual impairments to identify changes in sidewalk elevation
- New landscaping to improve aesthetics and create urban green spaces
- New customer drop off/loading and staff parking spaces on the west end of the property
- Extra lighting and video surveillance equipment added

Interior Renovations

- New cabinetry and countertops in employee work and break areas
- Granite flooring in passenger lobby
- Low consumption lighting

MVTA offers expanded service to University of Minnesota

Minnesota Valley Transit Authority (MVTA) is expanding its direct service to the University of Minnesota on Routes 465 and 475 beginning Tuesday, Sept. 4.

In 2007, the MVTA secured funding for expansion of I-35W service in 2012 via federal Congestion Mitigation Air Quality (CMAQ) funds. A total of \$1.36 million has been secured for three years of operating funds for Route 465 expansion and additional expansion along the I-35W corridor that will begin in 2013.

Mid-day, there will be 30-minute frequency and all trips will serve South Bloomington Transit Center and downtown Minneapolis. Alternating trips originate at County Road 42 and Portland Ave

Route 465 will serve Burnsville only; the local branch between the Apple Valley and Burnsville Transit Stations is eliminated. Service on Portland Ave., McAndrews Rd., and Nicollet Ave. will be available on alternating trips from the

Burnsville Transit Station.

There will be improved connections between Route 465 and northbound and southbound Route 444 service at Burnsville Transit Station

Route 475 Expanded to Serve Both Apple Valley and Cedar Grove Transit Stations

All Route 475 trips will begin at Apple Valley Transit Station and then serve Cedar Grove Transit Station.

The peak-period, peak direction schedule is expanded to 15-minute frequencies, with alternating trips serving and skipping the South Bloomington Transit Center.

Northbound trips added

- Depart Apple Valley at 6:33 a.m. and depart Cedar Grove at 6:45 a.m. (skipping downtown)
- Depart Apple Valley at 9:56 a.m. and depart Cedar

Grove at 10:08 a.m. serving downtown.

Southbound trips added:

- Depart Ridder Arena at 3:10 p.m. (serving downtown) and arriving at Cedar Grove at 3:59 p.m. and at Apple Valley at 4:11 p.m.
- Depart Ridder Arena at 6:10 p.m. (skipping downtown) and arriving at Cedar Grove at 6:42 p.m. and at Apple Valley at 6:54 p.m.

Trip times adjusted at Cedar Grove and northbound run time from Lake Street to 19th Ave. & Old Washington is increased by one minute.

Service changes will also occur on Routes 421, 444 and 480 (from Burnsville) (pick up pocket schedules, watch the MVTA web-site at www.mvta.com). Also of note, all trips that travel north to the Mall of America will now exit at Old Shakopee Road and travel to 28th Avenue and then to 82nd St. before entering the Mall. Timing studies indicate this routing will save time and is the preferred routing as significant construction around the Mall of America will begin later this year and continue through the 2013-2014 construction seasons.







Flood of 2012 impacts the DTA

The heavy rain began in the evening on June 19; but no one expected it to continue all night and throughout much of the morning the following day. As buses headed out of the garage that morning, flood waters had already created havoc with streets and bridges and several routes were impassable. Detours went into effect throughout the day as regional flood waters were funneled down streets,

streams and rivers into Lake Superior, uprooting pavements and seeping into basements. Buses were stuck in traffic - particularly on Grand Avenue where I-35 traffic was diverted as parts of the freeway were also flooded.

Several buses were dispatched to the Fond-du-Lac neighborhood in the early morning hours to evacuate residents.

The Miller Hill Mall area became a shallow lake and all those flood waters there were channeled down Miller Creek and under the DTA Operations Center before flowing into Lake Superior.

MINNEAPOLIS — Today was not only the first day back in class for Minneapolis Public Schools students, it also marks the first day of using public transit to get many students in that district to school.

Under the traditional yellow bus system, students who missed their rides may opt to stay home, especially if they can't find another way to school.




